Conairí Chaisleáin Riabhaigh

CASTLREA TOWN

A market town, bustling with amenities, services and facilities, Castlerea is beautifully situated in wooded countryside on the banks of the River Suck and the River Francis, both of which are tributaries of the River Shannon. It is steeped in history, heritage, scenic beauty and places of interest. Castlerea is the birthplace of Dr. William Wilde, father of Oscar Wilde, playwright, novelist, essayist and poet and Sir Douglas Hyde, celtic scholar, poet and First President of Ireland.

CAISLEÁN RIABHACH

Baile margaidh, beo briomhar le hásanna, seirbhísí agus saoráidi, tá Caisleán Riabhaigh suite i lísimtear tuaithe coillteach ar bhrúch Abhainn na Suca agus Abhainn Francis, an dá cheann acu ina bhfo-aibhneacha d'Abhainn na Sionaine. Tá an baile ar maos i stair, oidhreacht, áilleacht scéimhe agus áiteanna spéise. Is i gCaisleán Riabhaigh a rugadh an Dr. William Wilde, athair Oscar Wilde, drámadóir, úrscealaí, scribhneoir aistí agus file agus Dubhghlas de hÍde, scoláire Ceilteach, file agus an Céad Uachtaráin na hÉireann.

CASTLREA DEMESNE

Located in the heart of the town, Castlerea Demesne is a haven of tranquility, where you can take a leisurely stroll or cycle along the riverbank, enjoy scenic beauty, natural habitats and abundant wildlife. From Castlerea Demesne, to the north west, walkers can follow meandering trails through ancient woodland, home to a wealth of native flora and fauna.

DIMÉIN CHAISLEÁIN RIABHAIGH

Suite i gcoílár an bhaile, is áit an-suaimhneach i Diméin Chaisleán Riabhaigh, ar féidir leat dul ag siúl nōg rothiocht ar do shuaimeáineas ar bhrúach na habhann, taitneamh ar bhaith as an áilleacht scéimhe, na gráthóga nádúrtha agus a fhadhlúra flíseach. Ó Dhiméin Chaisleán Riabhaigh, go dtí an larthuaisearc, is féidir le siúlóiri conairí spásteoireachta a leanúint trí choilearnach ársa, áit a bhfull saibhreas flora agus fauna dúchasach.



CLONALIS HOUSE

These trails lead to Clonalis House, the Ancestral Home of the O'Conors, Kings of Connacht and at various times, the High Kings of Ireland. This impressive building has been sensitively restored over the last decade and visitors will find an elegant house with a large collection of family portraits, telling a unique and interesting story. By following the Castlerea Demesne trails to the south east, walkers can join the Suck Valley Way long-distance walking trail, leading to Ballintober Castle, the chief seat of the O'Connors of Connacht and one of the few surviving early medieval castles of an Irish ruler. From Clonalis House to Ballintober Castle, enjoy a 700 year walk through Irish History.

TEACH CHLUAIN MHALAS

Tugann na conairí sin chomh fada le Teach Chluain Mhalais tú, baile dúchais muintir Chonchobhair, Ríthe Chonnacht agus ag amanna eagsula, Ard-Ríthe na hÉireann. Tá atchóirí logar déanta ar an bhfeirgneamh mórtábhseach seo le deich mbliana annus agus feicfidh cuairteoirí teach galánta le bailiúchán móré portráidí teaghlacha a ionsonn scéal uathúil agus suimiúil. Má leanann siúlóiri Diméin Chaisleán Riabhaigh conairí soir ó dhéas, féadfaidh siad nascadh le conairí shiúil fad-achair Shli Ghleann na Suca, a thabharfaidh chomh fada le Caisleán Bhale an Tobair iad, príomhshluochán mhuintir Chonchobhair Chonnacht atá ar cheann den lón beag caisleán meánoiseach de chuid lucht ceannais na hÉireann atá fós ar an bhfód. Ó Teach Chluain Mhalais go Caisleán Bhail an Tobair, bain sult as siúlóid 700 bliain tri Stair na hÉireann.

No dogs permitted on the Suck Valley Way to Clonalis House. Dogs pose a danger to livestock and dog owners as a result



SUCK VALLEY WAY

Castlerea's trails form part of the long-distance national way-marked walking trail, the Suck Valley Way, passing through Counties Roscommon and Galway and the 'Nine Friendly Villages' of Ballygar, Creggs, Glinsk, Ballymoe, Ballintober, Donamon, Castlecoote, Athleague and Mount Talbot. The landscape en-route features river banks and lakes, bogs, callows, woodland, gentle hills and meadows and makes for wonderful and varied low-land walking.

The River Suck Valley can boast a wealth of history and heritage with many ring forts, castles and ancient churches along its banks. Of particular interest are the unique La Tène Stone at Castlestrange, an ovoid boulder of granite richly carved and dating from the Iron Age, and Donamon Castle, one of the oldest inhabited buildings in Ireland with a recorded history going back to 1154. The river and surrounding landscapes are rich in biodiversity - native Irish wildlife such as deer, hare and red squirrel can be spotted as you walk.

SLÍ GHLEANN NA SUCA

Tá conairí Chaisleán Riabhaigh mar chuid den chonair shiúil slímharcaille náisiúnta fad-achair, Slí Ghleann na Suca, a théann trí Chontae Ros Comáin agus Chontae na Gaillimhe agus na 'Naomh Sráidbháile Cairdiúil' - Béal Átha Gháortha, Na Creaga, Glinse, Béal Átha Mó, Baile an Tobair, Dún lomáin, Baile Mhic Oireachtaigh, Áth Liag agus Muin Talbóid. Cuimhní an tirdeach feadh an bheadlaigh bruacha abhann agus lochan, portaigh, caloi, coilleannacha, cnoic agus móinéir, rúd a chinniúin gur siúlód í seal-chrioch iontach agus éagsúil i seo.

Tá go leor staire agus oidhreacht ag baint le Gleann na Suca lena n-airtear ráthanna, caisleán agus séipéil órsa. Ar a cinn is uathúla tá Cloch La Tène ag Caisleán Stráinse, bollán ubhchruthach eibhlír ón iarranais atá snote go galanta, agus Caisleán Dhún lomáin, ceann de na foirgnimh is sine a bhfuil doine ina gcónaí ann in Éirinn agus téann a chuid stífead staire siar chomh fada de 1154. Tá an abhainn agus na tirdhreacha mógaíodh saibh ó thaobh na bithéagsúlachta de – is féidir fiadhla dúchasach na hÉireann ar nós fianna, giollaíochta agus iorai rúa a freiceáil agus tú ag siúl.
